And then it's a very relaxed day until the onslaught is what everybody comes. And we have the big meal of Turkey. We'll put the turkey on right about nine in the morning. So it's done for later that afternoon. Then we'll just have the most incredible, wild, raucous evening that you can imagine.

Great. Well, thank you for sharing about your Christmas traditions and memories fun. When it comes to holiday gift giving many people struggle with the wrapping. Some common pitfalls are waiting until the last minute, not having enough of the right supplies on hand and not having a designated place to wrap. According to a survey conducted by Scotch brand tapes, more than 1/4 of Americans said wrapping presence puts them more in the holiday spirit than shopping does. But nothing will turn us from a jolly elf into the Grinch. Like the frustration of running out of tape, odd shaped gifts, refusing to cooperate with wrapping paper, or a case of the missing scissors. While I cannot force you to wrap your gifts early, I can give you a few pointers to help curb your frustration and maybe retain some of your holiday cheer. Many years ago I decided I was done wrapping Christmas presents on the floor. Possibly because it was getting so much harder to get up off of the floor. Anyway, I carved out a little corner in our bedroom and I set up a card table, gathered up all of my holiday gift wrapping supplies and made a gift wrapping station, I stocked my little Christmas wrapping station with plenty of paper, gift bags, Tissue Tape, a couple of pair of scissors, Sharpies, pins, gift tags, and lots of ribbon. As my kids got older and started buying little gifts for friends and family, our gift wrap station moved out of our bedroom into a more public part of the house. So over the years, it's moved around to different places in the house. But we've always had a table setup. And we include all the supplies, we put a tub each for garbage and for recycling, because there's a lot of paper that gets wasted there, as well as some random small to medium empty shipping boxes, we just store them underneath the table. And if you get those boxes from Amazon rather than throw the boxes away, just put them under the table stacked one inside the other. And that way when you need a box for something that didn't come in a box, you have one available. If your station will be open to public view, you can certainly pretty it up by adding a festive tablecloth, just make sure it covers the supplies that are stored underneath the table. And you can keep all of those odds and ends and pins and name tags and supplies tidy, as well as pretty by organizing them into baskets that you already have in your house. Another culprit that might steal our gift giving joy is shopping for those hard to buy for people. Whether it's because they already have everything. They're picky, or you're just playing out of ideas, shopping for them can quickly become a dreaded chore. So I have a suggestion for unique gifts that also support your local economy. What is your town or your state or your province famous for? Are there unique products being made in your area where I live in the Texas Hill Country, we have wineries, peach orchards, beekeepers, lavender farms, smokehouses, leather workers, and olive groves. And gosh, a lot more. But that's just to name a few all within, I'd say a 50 mile radius of my house. And most of these, if not all of these family owned and operated businesses have gift shops. Ideally, if I'm planning ahead, I'll visit them during the year and I'll make purchases to assemble my own gift baskets. But that doesn't always happen, I will usually visit their website and just see what they have on offer. Often they'll already have a gift basket option that I can just order and ship directly to the recipient. Sometimes if I don't like what's in the gift basket, and it's a small enough operation, I'll just call them and I'll say, Hey, this is what I'd like to put together into a basket. Can you do that for me. And usually they're happy to do that. Now I know that you're going to pay a bit more to order these special baskets and have them shipped directly from the business. But sometimes, you know, you got to look at the value of time over money. And that might be a good option for you. If it's not and you're working on a really tight budget, I just would recommend planning ahead so that you have time to go and visit those

businesses. Purchase what you want, package it and ship it out yourself. Now I know we're getting closer to Christmas. So this might not be an option for you at this point. But if you're looking at giving gifts to people that you're going to hand deliver, maybe you could still do this is a great gift for anyone but especially for those long distance friends and family who you're not going to get to see at Christmas time. It's just a really sweet way to say we wish you were here with us. And so here's a little taste of our town and here's a little holiday cheer from our hometown to you. So I hope you found something useful in these tips that perhaps will help restore some of the joy of giving after all, the Lord loves a cheerful giver.
